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
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### 1. Introduction

Project monitoring and evaluation is an important component in plan, program and project implementation. The Public Sector Management Process indicated that Planning, Programming, Budgeting, Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation form a cycle that will ensure that all plans, programs and projects are implemented effectively and efficiently. Monitoring and Evaluation can be defined from the figure below.



Monitoring is conducted to improve program or project performance and to provide information to all stakeholders. It will capture the extent to which inputs are made available, how critical activities are being carried out and whether the expected outputs are being delivered. This can be used to take appropriate actions for the program or project implementation. On the other hand, Evaluation is undertaken to improve future programs and projects through feedback of lessons learned and to disclose information to stakeholders. Evaluation results may trigger changes of policy priorities, introduce new implementation models, create new programs, stop programs that do not work, reallocate resources to programs that deliver higher results/impact and those that are more cost-effective.

As indicated in the figure above, the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) and the Regional Development Council (RDC) are mandated to conduct Project Monitoring and Evaluation. To fulfill this mandate, the Regional Project Monitoring and Evaluation System (RPMES) was established through Executive Order (EO) No. 376 dated 02 November 1989 as a mechanism to facilitate project implementation, monitoring, and evaluation. The System presents the processes and procedures in monitoring and evaluating programs and projects at the national, regional, and sub-national levels. This also involves the generation of information on the overall physical and financial status of program and project implementation.





The Regional Project Monitoring Committee (RPMC) was created and tasked to implement the RPMES. NEDA, being the Secretariat of the RPMC, prepares the quarterly RPMES Reports that present the implementation status of major programs and projects in the region.

The RPMC-Project Monitoring Team (PMT), whose members are the designated staff of the member-agencies and the three PSRs, are responsible for the conduct of field monitoring visits (FMV) and problem-solving sessions (PSS), particularly for programs and projects with significant negative slippage or those experiencing implementation problems. The good implementation practices that are worth replicating are also noted during FMVs.

To commence the monitoring and evaluation (M&E) process, the RPMC Secretariat prepares

an Annual **M&E Plan** to serve as guide in the M&E activities for the year. The M&E Plan provides the list of priority programs and projects to be covered in the quarterly RPMES report and to be monitored and evaluated during the year.

# 2. Objectives

The CY 2024 M&E Plan aims to provide a list of programs and projects for monitoring and evaluation during the year, together with their planned monitoring schedule.

# 3. Scope and Coverage

This M&E Plan covers the following ongoing regional programs and projects for regular monitoring:

- a. Those identified in the Public Investment Program (PIP), Regional Development Investment Program (RDIP), Local Development Investment Program (LDIP);
- b. ICC-approved programs and projects;
- c. President's priority programs and projects (Infrastructure Flagship Projects and Eight-point Economic Agenda);








- d. Official Development Assistance (ODA);
- e. Public-Private Partnership (PPP);
- f. National Tax Allocation (NTA);
- g. Peace, security, and development sector-related programs and projects to end local communist armed conflict (ELCAC);
- h. Those that are related to disaster or emergency rehabilitation and reconstruction;
- i. Critical and high impact to the region's development;
- j. Projects that cover two or more provinces; and
- k. Flagship programs and projects of provincial local government units.

# 4. Modes of Monitoring and Evaluation

# 4.1 Table Monitoring and Evaluation

Programs and projects for table monitoring and evaluation generally include all the listed priority programs and projects in this M&E Plan (see Table 1). Additional programs and projects raised for monitoring and evaluation by implementing agencies will also be included, as necessary.

The accomplishment reports submitted regularly by implementing agencies serve as basis in monitoring evaluating the implementation status or performance of these programs and projects. This is documented through the quarterly RPMES report MS-Excel format. A narrative report is also prepared every semester.







## 4.2 Field Monitoring Visits and Problem-Solving Sessions

Programs and projects for Field Monitoring Visit (FMV) and/or problem-solving sessions (PSS) are identified based on any of the following criteria:

- a. ODA-funded programs and projects;
- b. Programs and projects encountering implementation problems;
- c. Programs and projects incurring at least negative 15 percent physical slippage as per Presidential Decree No. 1870, series of 1983, DPWH Department Order No. 193 s. 2016, and other similar issuances; and
- d. Programs and projects with good implementation practices that are worth replicating.

**FMVs** and/or PSS primarily aim to validate the physical status of projects, to determine the causes of delays and ascertain whether these are justifiable or not, and provide to remedial and/or action recommendations to implementers to fast track the completion of programs and projects. These are conducted by the RPMC-PMT at least once in every quarter.

As necessary, the **RPMC** implements blended or hybrid Field Monitoring Visits. This strategy involves the participation of the Provincial **Project** Monitoring Committees (PPMC) and implementing agencies for field monitoring visits. The Zoom platform is
